Canon Matthew's Catechism

Why do we use incense at Mass?

At some Masses on important occasions, we use incense. This has a long history going back to Old Testament times, when incense was offered to God in the Jerusalem temple, along with the animal sacrifices (see Exodus 30: 1-10). God gives Moses a recipe for making the incense: "Take these aromatic substances: storax, onycha and galbanum, these and pure frankincense in equal parts; and blend them into incense... This incense shall be treated as most sacred by you." (Exodus 30: 34-36). John the Baptist's father, Zechariah, was a priest of the Jewish religion. He was taking his turn in the temple when the angel Gabriel appeared to him informing him, he was to have a son. The temple duty he was performing at the time was the evening offering of incense. As he did so his actions echoed Psalm 141:2: "Let my prayer be incense before you; my uplifted hands an evening offering." It would also make sense that the first Christians used incense in the Holy Eucharist, many of them were Jews, and they would have seen the Eucharist as the fulfilment of temple worship. In the Book of Revelation St John has a vision of the worship of heaven. He understands the worship of heaven to be a completion of Jewish temple worship in which incense is used in great quantities (see Rev. 5:8). From the fifth century onwards, we know that Christians used incense in the Mass. This was a symbol of prayers rising to God just as the sweet-smelling smoke of incense rises. It is also used as a symbol of sanctifying and purifying being used in blessings and consecrating holy ground. Each time incense is used in Mass it signifies the presence of the divinity. The altar is incensed as a symbol of Christ, then the Book of the Word of God, then the offerings which will become the eucharist, then the priest and people, and finally the Holy Eucharist after it is consecrated. Each incensation signifies the presence of God in different ways.

Education Sunday

Education Sunday is when Catholic Church congregations commemorate their predecessors of the 19th century, many of whom were living in poverty, paying for schools to be built. Our parishioner forebears and their Bishops rightly saw education as the principal means of handing on the faith and improving the spiritual, moral, social and cultural lives of children and young people. Their sacrifices helped re-establish the 2,175 Catholic schools and four universities that we celebrate in church on 10 September. Established by the Bishops in 1848, Education Sunday is one of the oldest Days of Special Prayer in the liturgical calendar of England and Wales. In the 175 years since then the Catholic Church has become the country's largest provider of secondary schools and second-largest provider of primary schools. Catholic education is by far the largest charitable activity of the Church here, and we give thanks for the many thousands of teachers, lecturers, academics, support staff, leaders, governors, advisers and others who have found their vocation in Catholic education, and without whom this would be impossible. Catholic schools continue to be true to their mission... For this success to continue, however, the help of the whole Catholic community remains essential. As throughout history, all Catholics need to be prepared to support, promote and defend Catholic education. There are many ways to do this: in prayer for vocations to Catholic education; asking your diocese about becoming a school foundation governor; or encouraging a young person to become a teacher in a Catholic school. Catholic education is indeed a tremendous achievement to be celebrated - happy Education Sunday. *Extracts taken from "The Foreward" by Paul Barber, Director of the Catholic Education Service.*

School admissions

to Catholic Secondary Academies (Year 7) - children born between 01/09/2012 and 31/08/2013. The deadline for submitting your application for a school place is 31st October 2023. Application forms are available on your 'home' Local Authority website. For every Catholic school you apply for if you wish your child to be considered and ranked under a faith criterion you should also complete a supplementary information form, and return this form to the school by the deadline, (forms are available from the LA and the school). You MUST also include the supporting evidence as required with this form, eg baptism certificate (photocopies acceptable; if you do not have the evidence contact the parish where your child was baptised for a copy certificate in good time but please note there may be a charge for this). Failure to supply the required supporting evidence will mean your child is ranked in a lower criterion which may affect your chance of a place.
