

One of the wonderful aspects of being presented with Gospel passages from Mark every weekend, is that a lot of the scenes are very familiar to us.

Bartimaeus receiving his sight from Jesus, is an encounter that is often talked about in the classrooms of primary schools. It's a story packed with so much significance. Bartimaeus reaches out to Jesus in faith. Twice he uses the phrase, "Have mercy on me." As is often the case when a stranger from the crowd reaches out to Jesus, he is rebuked. This is a theme that appears regularly as Jesus walks through towns and villages. But why rebuke this man of faith? Why be so dismissive of a man with a disability? There is no sense to it. Jesus recognises Bartimaeus as the most important face in the crowd and tells him, "Your faith has healed you." The persistence of his calling of Jesus and not allowing those who would rebuke him to sideline him is what characterises Bartimaeus. He will go on to follow Jesus on the dusty roads, seeing at first hand the power of the Son of Man.

REFLECT

ome commentators of today's reading invite us to reflect a little on our own spiritual blindness. We can be blinded by passion, ambition and unforgiveness. As Harold A. Buetow states, "conservatives see the blind spots of liberals, liberals of conservatives; the poor see the blind spots of the middle classes. We can be blind to a lack of caring relationships with friends and peers." Indeed the image of Bartimaeus throwing off his cloak today and following Jesus in faith and love is an image for us all to live by. He is determined not to be looked down upon anymore. He was condemned to live a life of poverty, begging on the streets of Jericho. His lot was a difficult one and despite the stigma attached to living a life as a beggar, Bartimaeus was a very persistent and determined heckler the day Jesus walked by. There was no spiritual blindness on the part of Jesus. As a matter of fact, in this encounter, the spiritual blindness of society was taken away. The cry of the poor and the cry of Bartimaeus leads us to the words of Psalm 6:3-7 - "Have mercy on me. Lord, I have no strength, I am exhausted with my groaning; every night I drench my pillow with tears; I bedew my bed with weeping. My eyes waste away with grief." As the blind mind reaches out with faith and pain in his heart, Jesus reaches out with mercy and tenderness. It is a beautiful image of how the Church must act in the world.

And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, "Son of David, have pity on me." Jesus stopped and said, "Call him here." So, they called the blind man. "Courage," they said, "get up; he is calling you." So, throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, "What do you want me to do for you?" "Rabbuni," the blind man said to him "Master, let me see again." Jesus said to him, "Go; your faith has saved you." And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.
